The Case of the Light for the Unlikely Genesis 22:18; Isaiah 54:6; Acts 1 by Connie Dever

Our story is: The Case of the Light for the Unlikely. As you listen to the story, see if you can figure out:

- 1. Who was the Light? Why was He called the Light?
- 2. Who were Likely People to receive Him and who were the Unlikely People to receive Him? What did both kinds of people need to do to receive the Light?

This story starts out in Old Testament times, thousands of years before Jesus lived on earth.

"If you will obey me and keep my covenant, you will be my treasured possession among all peoples, for all the earth is mine," the LORD promised the people of Israel on Mt. Sinai. And hadn't He shown them already just how precious they were to Him? He had just sent Moses to rescue them from slavery under the mighty Egyptians. He had just protected them from the Egyptian soldiers with a great pillar of cloud, and even parted the Red Sea for them escape unharmed. He had given them His good laws and made a solemn covenant promise to always love and care for them. He was giving them the beautiful land of Canaan to live in and enjoy as their very own. Oh, to be an Israelite! To be God's treasured possession! This was certainly a promise they could trust!

But what about the rest of the world? All the rest of those people, whom the Israelites lumped together under one big word: Gentiles. Did God really not care about them? Sometimes the Israelites acted as if God didn't, even though He had told them otherwise. "I'm going to bless all nations through a child that come through you and your family, the Israelites," the LORD had told Abraham. Who would that child be? The Messiah, Jesus, to save them from their sins.

Through Isaiah, God told the Israelites what He would do through Jesus: "It is too small a thing for the Messiah, there to settle down and live after retiring from the the Savior Jesus, to save only My people from the nation of Israel. I will also make him a light for the Gentiles, that he may bring my salvation to the ends of the earth." (adapted from Isaiah 54:6)

Yes. Israel was special. But Israel was just a beginning, just a part of God's one, big plan to save a countless number of people from every nation of the world. God was using them to bring the blessing of salvation to all the people of the world, for Jesus the Messiah, the

Savior, would come from Israel.

Some Gentiles came to saving faith even before Jesus came. We know a few of their stories. There was Rahab from Jericho that helped the Israelites sent to spy on her city of Jericho. And Ruth, who would be the grandmother of great King David. There were others, too. These few Gentiles looked forward in faith to the day God would send His Savior.

At last, Jesus did come. He was fully God and fully man. He lived a perfect life, then offered it up on the cross, as the perfect sacrifice for God's people, all who would ever turn from their sins and trust in Him as their Savior. He suffered and died for their sins, then on the third day, He rose up from the dead in victory over sin and death for all of God's people.

"Go into all the world, making disciples and teaching them," Jesus told His disciples, after He rose from the dead. Now, the message of salvation would be spread far and wide. Yes, it was still time for Jesus to be the Savior to any of the Israelites who trusted in Him as their Savior. But even more, Jesus was going to be the light for the Gentiles, as His disciples took the good news of salvation through Jesus to the them. So out and away the disciples went. First just to nearby cities, then to places farther and farther away.

Three believers, Paul, Silas and Luke, traveled by sea and land to a country called Macedonia, sharing the good news of Jesus as they went. One day they came to the great city of Philippi. Philippi was one of most important cities of all of Macedonia. The Roman Emperor had even made it a Roman colony! Merchants and traders came to Philippi bringing their goods from the nearby port to sell and many Roman soldiers came

Story-telling Tips

Ahead of time:

- 1. Read the Bible verses and story. Pray!
- 2. Create story cue cards on index cards (or highlight text).
- 3. Practice telling story dramatically, timing your presentation Shorten, if necessary to fit your allotted time.

army. There were temples to the Roman gods and even a coliseum for gladiator shows and Olympic games. How wonderful it would be for these people to hear the message of Jesus!

"Repent, believe, trust in Jesus and live! He is the only way to be saved from your sins." Paul told a group of people gathered for prayer by the Gangites River outside the city. These were people who heard of the Lord God and believed in Him, but had never heard about Jesus.

"Long ago, Paul told them, "The LORD spoke through the prophet Isaiah about Jesus, the coming Messiah. He told them, 'It is too small a thing for you to be my servant to restore the tribes of Jacob and bring back those of Israel I have kept. I will also make you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring my salvation to the ends of the earth.' We have come to tell you about that Savior, Jesus Christ, that you might trust in Him as your Savior." Paul's message was eagerly accepted and many were baptized that day.

Paul and Silas rejoiced to see so many accept Jesus as their Savior, but Satan, God's great enemy, was not. Before long, big trouble was brewing for Paul and Silas. Angry men stirred up a crowd against them. City officials arrested Paul and Silas, beaten with rods and thrown into jail.

"Guard these men carefully," the city officials ordered the jailer. So he put them in the inner cell-- and fastened their feet in the stocks.

"What are these men in trouble for?" the jailer wanted to know.

"For trying to turn the people away from the Roman gods to another foreign god named Jesus who they claim to be the way to be saved!" he was told.

How the metal of the stocks must have cut into Paul and Silas' legs! How stiff their bodies must have been from being beaten! But Paul and Silas didn't grumble or complain. Instead they sang praises to God, long into the night. They knew that Jesus really was the way to be saved. He was worth suffering for, even dying for. They were grateful to God for being allowed to suffer for His name and to get to bring the good news of Jesus, the light to the Gentiles, the one who brought salvation to the nations.

About midnight, Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that shook the prison. At once, the prison doors flew open, and everybody's chains came loose. The jailer woke up, and when he saw the prison doors open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself because he thought the prisoners had escaped. He was in a panic! He knew he would be killed if he lost any of them. He would rather kill himself than let someone else do it.

But Paul shouted, "Don't harm yourself! We are all here!"

What strange men these were! Beaten and imprisoned for sharing about this strange God, Jesus, who they claimed as the way to be saved. Praising Jesus' name rather than cursing Him for being put in stocks! Then, when given a chance to escape for their lives, they stay where they are and try to keep him from killing himself! Perhaps this foreign god is the true God!" the jailer thought.]

The jailer called for lights, rushed in and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. He then brought them out and asked, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?"

They replied, "Repent! Trust in Jesus and live! He is the only way to be saved from your sins -- you and your household." Then they spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all the others in his house. At that hour of the night the jailer took them and washed their wounds; then immediately he and all his family were baptized. The jailer brought them into his house and set a meal before them; he was filled with joy because he had come to believe in God--he and his whole family.

The next day, Paul and Silas were released from prison and sent out of Philippi. Were they heading home after their terrible beating? No, they did not. They headed out for new places to tell others about Jesus. They were stiff, bruised and sore, but they praised God. He was using them to bring the light of Jesus to the Gentiles and salvation to people of another nation, just as He had promised through the prophet Isaiah hundreds of years earlier. God's one, big plan to save His people from every land was being fulfilled.

- **1. Who was the Light? Why was He called the Light?** Jesus was the Light. A light shines brightly and shows the way. Jesus, the Son of God, came to show what God was like. He not only showed the way for sinners to come to God, but He made the way, Himself.
- 2. Who were Likely People to receive Him and who were the Unlikely People to receive Him? What did both kinds of people need to do to receive the Light? The people of Israel were the Likely People and the Gentiles (non-Jews) were the Unlikely people. Both Jew and Gentile must confess their sins, turn away from them and trust in Jesus as their Savior, if they are to be saved. This is the only way to God.

What would cause Paul and Silas to praise God for getting to suffer for Him? Only their love for God and their faith that Jesus was really the only way to God. They remembered how Jesus had suffered to pay for their sins and the sins of all who turn and trust in Him. They counted it an honor to suffer so that other might know about Him.

The same message that Paul, Luke and Silas took to Macedonia is the same message we all need to hear and believe: "Repent of your sins, trust in Jesus and live! He is the only way to be saved from your sins."

Let's praise our Saving God who through Jesus made a way for sinners to come to Him. Let's ask Him for work in our hearts, helping us to repent of our sins, and believe in Him, too. Let's ask Him to give us courage to boldly tell others about Him, too, that He might use us in His one, big plan.

Jesus Is the Only Way to Be Saved

The Bible tells us that we have all rebelled against God and deserve His punishment for our sins. It tells us that our sins are so great that there is no way that we can ever earn God's forgiveness on our own. None of us can ever save ourselves.

Jesus came to earth as a man. He was fully God and fully man. How amazing! He lived a perfect life. He's the only one who has ever done that! On the cross, Jesus offered up His life. He suffered and died as the perfect sacrifice needed for the sins of God's people. On the third day, Jesus rose from the dead, showing that He had completely paid for their sins. Yes! He had won the victory over sin and death for them!

Now all who turn away from living a life of sin (repent) and put their trust in Jesus as their Savior will be forgiven their sins. They will be saved from the punishment for their sins they deserve and will live as God's dearly loved people forever.

Understanding the Bible Truth

- 11. When someone is forgiven their sins, what are they saved from? The punishment they deserve from God for their sins.

Bible Verse Connection Question

1. What does our Bible Truth have to do with our **Bible Verse: John 14:2-6**: "In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also. And you know the way to where I am going."Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."?

Jesus tells us that He is the Way, the Truth and the Life. He was making the Way for God's sinful people to come to the Father. No one goes to the Father, except through Him. If He did not do this, then no one goes to the Father. He is the Truth: believe in the Father and believe in Him! He is the Life: after this is over, God's people will see Him again. He was going away to prepare a place for them in heaven--His Father's house. He would be going away, but one day He would come back and take God's people to be with Him forever."

Bible Truth Story Connection Questions

1. Why were Paul and Silas willing to travel all those miles to Macedonia to tell people about Jesus? Because they knew Jesus was the only way to be saved. If they didn't go, the people wouldn't hear about Jesus and could not be saved.

2. Why were Paul and Silas so joyful in prison? Because they thought about all that Jesus had done for them by taking the terrible punishment for their sins. They counted it an honor to suffer for One who had done so much for them.

The Gospel

1. Why do people need Jesus to make a way to the Father for them? What is the gospel?

God is the good Creator and King of the world. He made people to worship Him and live by His good laws. But we are all sinners who have rebelled against Him. We all deserve death--God's just, eternal punishment for our sins. How terrible! But God has good news for us. In His great mercy, God sent His Son Jesus to earth to save sinners. Yes, Jesus, the perfect Son of God, left His home in heaven and became a man. He lived the perfect life that pleases God. (He's the only one who has ever done that!) He offered it up to God His Father as the perfect sacrifice for sins when He suffered and died on the cross. Then, on the third day, Jesus rose from the dead in victory. He had fully paid for the sins of God's people, so they wouldn't have to! Now all who turn away from their sins and trust in Jesus as their Savior will receive forgiveness of sins and eternal life with God. They will be His very own special people who will know Him and enjoy Him forever. We can be God's people, too, if we turn from our sins and trust in Jesus as our own Savior.

Game: Circle and Cross

Materials

Beanbags, 1 per child Masking Tape Bible Truth Questions

Preparing the Game

- 1. Choose 20+ questions for your game from the Bible Truth Discussion Questions, or make up your own.
- 2. Write the Bible Truth questions on small thin strips of paper (or make a photocopy of the Bible Truth Discussion Questions and simply cut them into strips) and put them in the bag/bowl.
- 3. Tape a circle about 2' in diameter on the floor. Tape a large X in the middle of it.
- 4. Mark one team's set of beanbags with a small piece of masking tape or other distinguishing mark.

Playing the Game

Divide the children into two teams, giving the members of each team a beanbag of the same color or marking. Have all the children stand outside of the circle, about 6'back. At your signal, have the children toss their beanbags into the circle, trying to make them land on the taped X. Count up the beanbags for each team that landed on it. That's how many points their quiz question is worth. Choose a question for each team from the bag/bowl. If a team gets it wrong, the question goes to the other team for 1 point, if they can get the correct answer. Gather up the beanbags and continue play.

Game continues as number of questions, time, and attention span allow.

Non-competitive Option

Set a target number of points for the whole group. Challenge the children to see how many turns it takes score the target number of points. Once the target has been reached, start the game over and see how many turns it takes to reach the target the second time.

Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Quiz Questions

Have the children choose a few of the questions from the game to ask the parents/other children during
TAKING IT TO OTHERS time. Help pre-readers by whispering the question in their ear and letting them ask it aloud to the parents/other children. Make sure you read the Bible verse aloud before you ask your questions.

Understanding the Song

1. What great things has God done that we should glory Him? He has sent His Son Jesus to be the Way for sinners to come to God.

2. How did God show how much He loved the world?

He gave His very own Son to come and suffer a terrible death to pay for the sins of His people.

- 3. What does "atonement" mean? Making peace with someone after being enemies.
- 4. What does it mean that Jesus yielded His life as an atonement for sin? To yield one's life means to give it up. Jesus gave up His life to pay for the sins of His sinful people so that there would be peace between God and them.
- 5. What is a lifegate? A lifegate is a made up word that means the way to eternal life with God.
- 6. Who may have eternal life?

All may go in. Anyone who turns from their sins and trusts in Jesus as the payment for their sins may be saved.

- 7. Why should the people rejoice and praise the Lord? Because Jesus has made the way to the Father.
- 8. How do we come to the Father? Through faith in Jesus the Son's payment for our sins.

Bible Truth Connection Question

1. How does this song relate to our Bible Truth: Jesus Is the Only Way to Be Saved?

We give glory to God for giving us His Son to be the payment for sins. Sinners could never pay for their sins. Only by Jesus giving up His life in the place of sinners could there ever be a way for them to come to the Father.

Story Connection Question

1. How does this song relate to today's story? Paul and Silas were willing to face beatings and jail in order to tell the Philippians about Jesus, who made the Way for them to come to the Father. Even in prison they praised the Lord for the honor of telling others this good news.

Life Application Questions

- 1. How can God's people affected by the message of this song? Every day, no matter how bad things are, they always have something even greater to thank God for. Jesus has made the Way to the Father so that all who turn and trust in Him can know and enjoy Him forever in heaven.
- 2. How can we become God's people? By turning away from our sins and trusting in Jesus as our Savior.

Materials

Bible verse written up in large print so that all can see 1 or more Frisbees (or bean bag) Masking tape marker and paper small container

Preparing the Game

1. Divide the verse into 5 to 10 sections and place a word/verse section in each section. Write point values on the word/verse section, higher points for a word near the beginning of the verse; lower points for a word closer to the end. Tape these down.

- 2. As you read the script, lead the children in actions/sound effects to do with you.
- 3. If desired, you can read the script and stop at certain sentences and ask them what a good action/sound effect would be to act out what you just read.
- 4. Repeat the re-enactment one or two times more.

CASE REPLAY, SR: OLDER CHILDREN

Description: The children act out the story as a three-scene play. You will narrate it using the Case RePlay, Sr. script and they will act it out (no spoken words, for the most part), with each child assuming a different character's role. This activity is most suitable for first grade and up. You will review the story, then practice it a few times before performing it for others.

Materials

The Case RePlay, Sr. script

White board or other large format paper (if using a word bank)

Costumes and props

Preparation

- 1. Prepare for the play by choosing costumes and props for each character in the story. Decorate the area with any scenery props.
- 2. Write the words "Beginning," "Middle," "End" on a large piece of paper/whiteboard with plenty of space under each heading. You will use this paper to help the children think about the story as a three-scene play, as it is presented in the script.

Instructions

- 1. Tell the children that they will get to act out the story as a three-scene play, with a beginning, middle and end section. Tell them that before they can act it out, they need to think it out. as you narrate it with your script.
- 2. Take the children's answers as they recount the story, helping them put key incidents in the right order.
- 3. If desired, when they have filled in their Beginning, Middle, End, read through your whole (real) script, so they hear exactly what you will have them act out.
- 4. Then tell the children that it's time to practice acting out the story.
- 5. Assign parts to each child. If you are using costumes, do NOT give them out at this point. They will be a distraction.
- 6. Have all the children sit on the floor or in chairs on one side of the "stage," then call the characters up in place as their part in the story comes.
- 7. As you read the script, guide the children in where you want them to move or do to act it out.
- 8. After going through the whole script once, give out any costumes and props and act out the script once or twice more.

- 4. Make a sample for the children to see.

Making the Craft

- 1. Show children your sample.
- 2. Have the children decorate Paul and Silas, adding face, torn clothes and cuts and bruises. They can also color in the stocks if they want.
- 3. Bend the cardboard figures at the waist and at the knees.
- 4. Assemble the stocks by lining up the holes and sticking the paper fastener through them both. Fasten in the back.

Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Craft Presentation

If you are presenting the craft to other children or parents the children can hold up their crafts (or your model craft) and read their Bible Truth Connection answers to explain the importance of the craft.

<u>CASE CRAFT</u> Discussion Guide

Instructions:

As the children are settled into making their craft, ask them these questions to help them understand the craft's significance. Use the answers provided to guide the children's answers.

Discussion Questions

- 1. What did Paul and Silas go to Philippi to do? To tell the people there the good news of Jesus.
- 2. What happened to them when they shared the gospel? They were arrested, beaten and put in stocks in jail.
- 3. What surprising thing did they do in jail? Why did they do this? They sang hymns of praise to God because they had been able to tell many people in Philippi about Jesus.
- 4. What is Bible Truth that we are learning? *Jesus Is the Only Way to Be Saved.*
- 5. What does our craft have to do with our Bible Truth: Jesus Is the Only Way to Be Saved. Paul and Silas knew that Jesus is the only way for people to be saved. They were willing even to suffer in order for the people of Philippi to hear the good news of salvation through Jesus.
- 6. What can our craft help us remember? God gives His people joy and strength to tell others about Jesus, even when it is very, very hard.


Have children hold up your model craft/their crafts. Choose five children (or you say) the five sections below to explain the craft's importance.


- 1. Our craft is: Paul and Silas Beaten and in Stocks.
- 2. In the inner cell of the jail in Philippi, Paul and Silas sang hymns of praise to God even though they had been beaten and put in stocks because they had been able to tell many people in Philippi about Jesus.
- 3. Our Bible Truth is: Jesus Is the Only Way to Be Saved.
- 4. Paul and Silas knew that Jesus is the only way for people to be saved. They were willing even to suffer in order for the people of Philippi to hear the good news of salvation through Jesus.
- 5. Our craft can help us remember that God gives His people joy and strength to tell others about Jesus, even when it is very, very hard.

Note: Even non-readers can participate in presenting the craft, if you will whisper what they are to say in their ear and let them say it aloud for the others to hear.

BEFORE CLASS:

I. PICK YOUR PERSON

VIPPs can be anyone in your church! Typically, they fall into 6 categories: Church staff, Elders, Deacons/deaconesses, Special Volunteers (people who aren't paid, but spend a lot of time helping out in particular ways), Supported Workers (aka missionaries), and Church Members.

2. GATHER YOUR FACTS

Use the VIPP Information Sheet to write down the facts about your VIPP. The information on this worksheet is used in the VIPP activities, listed in the "Choose an Activity" section below.

DURING THE ACTIVITY:

I. INTRODUCE YOUR VIPP

Introduce your VIPP to the children, using the VIPP Information Sheet. Fill in a set of VIPP Clue Cards with the information for your VIPP. If desired, you can even have the actual person come into class for the children to meet.

Need help describing what someone does for the church in a kid-friendly way? Check out the list of common VIPPs on the Praise Factory website in the PFI resources. There are lots of kid-friendly descriptions for common VIPP's, such as pastors, elders, deacons and a lot more.

2. PRAY!

Lead the children in praying for the VIPP. Ask the children if they would like to pray for one of the VIPPs prayer requests. Even non-readers can pray for the VIPP if you whisper the prayer request in their ear, then let them say it aloud. Never force a child to pray!

3. CHOOSE AN ACTIVITY

There are two activities you can use to help the children learn about the VIPP:

VIPP Clue Cards: These are nine coloring sheets in which children fill in the nine things they learn about the VIPP from the VIPP Information Sheet. Photocopy a set of each child. Use as few or as many of these Clue Cards as you desire. They are found in the back of this book.

VIPP Game: This is a game that uses a set of Clue Cards for one or two VIPPs.

Choose a VIPP and fill in his/her information on the VIPP Information Sheet. Fill in a set of VIPP Clue Cards with the information for your VIPP. Tell the children about the VIPP, having them fill in the VIPP Clue Cards with the key facts as they learn them. Write any words the children need to write on a white-board or other piece of paper so they can see how to spell them. Help younger children write these words on their clue cards. Ideas for how to tell the children about many common VIPPs are listed at praisefactory.org with the resources for this Bible Truth.

Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Introduce and Pray for the VIPP

If you are presenting the VIPP to other children or parents you can assign children to hold up the 10 clue cards and say what each card tells about the VIPP. (Or, you can have the children hold them up as you tell what each one means.) Then lead the children in praying for the VIPP.

Game: Crabbin' Around

Materials

Information Sheet for two VIPPs 2 Sets of Clue Cards Tape A Bag

Preparing the Game

- 1. Fill in one set of clue sheets for the VIPP you are using.
- 2. Put all the Clue Cards in a bag, except for the ones with the names and pictures of the VIPPs.
- 3. Tape the picture and name of each VIPP to the wall, about 3 feet from the ground.

Playing the Game

Reveal: Tell the children about the VIPPs, showing them your filled-in clue cards as you tell about them.

Review: Put the Clue Cards for both VIPPS put in one bag. Mix up. Have children sit down, with their legs in front of them and their hands propped behind them. Show them how to get in crab position and try moving around. (Moving on hands and feet, with front side facing up). Tell them that you will pull out a clue, tell them what it is and they are to crab-crawl their way to the picture of the person who it belongs to. Give them the answer after everyone has run to their guessed person. Continue until all clues have been used up.
