**The Case of the Talking Tea Chests**

**Our story is called:****The Case of the Talking Tea Chests.****As you listen to the story, see if you can figure out:**

1. Who had the tea chests? How did he make them talk?
2. Who did he want them to talk to? What did they do when they heard what the tea chests had to say?

This story is not in the Bible. It is a true story about God's people obeying Jesus' command to spread the good news of salvation to the whole world. It takes place near the North Pole in Canada, in the 1830's.

"Crack! Crack! went the whip. "Now then, Curly, do your share! Come on, Puller, it's not far now," shouted the driver of the sled to his dogs.

"Crack! Crack!" The long whip snapped again, and the sled shot forward over the snow as the four, tired dogs pulled on steadily. The only sound was the tinkling of the bells on the moose-skin collars of the dogs, the crunching of the crisp snow under the sled boards, and occasionally in the distance the howling of a lone grey wolf.

Presently they passed from the open snow-field into a patch of half-burnt scrub. "Is this the place where we camp tonight?" the driver asked the two silent Indians who, for hours, had been running along beside the dogs. "Yes," the leader replied, "there is plenty of wood charred by last year's fire which will burn well."

In a few minutes the dogs were unharnessed and rolling on their backs in the snow. One of them began licking his tired feet, while the others nosed about for a rabbit or a ptarmigan (a type of small bird).

While James Evans unpacked the sled, the Indians chopped down a few charred tree-trunks, lit a bright crackling fire, and with their snow-shoes shoveled up a great bank of snow on three sides of it. Soon the water in their kettles was boiling, and the stiff frozen fish placed near the fire was thawed, cooked, and thrown to the hungry dogs. Next the men warmed up their own meal of tea and pemmican (flattened, dried buffalo meat) and tried to eat it before it froze solid again in the bitter cold air.

When supper was over, both dogs and men crawled close to the fire. The men talked about plans for the

next day's trip, had a time of prayer and singing to the Lord, then prepared themselves for bed. They spread out buffalo-skins and blankets, and wound them round themselves several times, covering even their heads, to protect themselves from getting frost-bite. Then they lay down with their feet to the fire, sheltered from the bitter wind by the bank of snow.

Each day they traveled further north in the bitter cold. Why were the men risking their lives like this? To take the good news of Jesus to the Cree Indians. How would they have a chance to trust in Jesus as their Savior if no one braved the snow and cold to tell them?

After weeks of travel, the men arrived at the Cree village. Many of these Indians had never seen a Paleface—a white-skinned man—before, and they crowded around in wonder.

"Hello, my friends," James Evans greeted them in the Cree language, "come gather around my camp-fire and I will tell you stories of Gitche Manito, the Mighty. He is the Great Spirit who loves all people. He sent His Son Jesus into the world to tell about Gitche Manito and to pay for the sins of all who turn away from their sins and trust in Him."

The Crees listened to Evans for hours as he told them stories of Jesus. Slowly, they began to understand.

"It is not enough for me to tell these Cree Indians about Gitche Manito and His Son Jesus who made the way for people to know Him," James Evans decided. "I can only be with them for a few months at a time. These people need to be able to read about Him by themselves. Then, they can keep learning more about Him, even when I am gone. But how?" he wondered. "There are so many problems! I hardly know how to speak Cree and they have no written language—not

**Story-telling Tips**

Ahead of time:

1. Read the Bible verses and story. Pray!
2. Create story cue cards on index cards (or highlight text).
3. Practice telling story dramatically, timing your presentation. Shorten, if necessary to fit your allotted time.
4. Decorate area with story props that help bring your story alive.

During your presentation:

1. Maintain as much eye contact as possible as you tell the story. Point to/use props at important points in the story. Include the kids in your story with a few questions about what they think will happen or words/concepts that might be new to them.
2. Watch the kids for signs that their attention span has been reached. Shorten, if necessary.

even an alphabet! What am I to do?"

For many days Evans thought and prayed for a plan. At last one came to mind. "Indian hunters draw pictures on a piece of bark showing a buffalo being captured or a fish being caught. Maybe I can make simple pictures that stand for sounds and put them together to make words," he decided.

So James Evans thought up a simple picture for every sound in the Cree language. Then he gathered together Chief Grey Moose and some of the other Cree men to begin teaching them.

James Evans used the end of a charred stick to make the sound pictures on a large board made of birch-bark. "This sign stands for 'ma'" he said as he pointed to the sound picture on the board. "Will you all say 'ma'?" he asked.

"Ma," they replied.

"This sign stands for 'nee'" as he made that symbol on the board. "Will you all say 'nee'?" James Evans asked them.

"Nee," they all repeated.

"Now say 'Ma-nee' as I point to the signs."

"Ma-nee," they replied.

"This is the sign for 'to'" "Will you all say 'to'?"

"To," came the answer.

"Let's say them together, as I point to them?"

"Ma-nee-to," they said, repeating the sounds slowly.

"Maneeto!" they exclaimed excitedly. The birch bark is talking. It is saying words! Can the birch bark say other words?" they asked.

"Oh yes," said Evans, "it can speak many things. I will teach you read all the words of Gitche Manito the Mighty, yourself," Evans told them.

The Cree were so excited! Soon so many students joined his class that he couldn't teach them all from his picture board. "I must print part of the Bible for them to learn to read from," Evans decided. "But how? I have no paper. Maybe I could make paper out of birch bark," he thought. And maybe I could make lead stamps for each of the sound pictures to print them on the birch bark."

So that's what they did. The squaws beat birch bark strips into thin pieces and cut them into sheets of paper. A Cree Indian named Cutshanoquin took lead from Evans' tea chests and melted it down. James carefully

poured it into clay molds and made stamps for each sound picture. Then he began the work of stamping out the words of one of the Gospels into the little symbols that made up the Cree's new written language on the birch bark paper.

After months of hard work, Evans finished printing out one of the Gospels (one of the books of the Bible that tells the story of Jesus) in the Cree language. How happy the Cree were to read the story of how Jesus, God's Son, came to make the way to God, for all who turn away from their sins and trust in Him as their Savior!

Not long after Evans finished the gospel, he had to leave the Crees and go back south to his family in Manitoba. He was sad to leave them, but was thankful to be able to leave the Cree a "talking book" about Gitche Manito the Mighty and His Son, Jesus that would tell them how they could turn from their sins and trust in Him as Savior long after he was gone.

And what happened to the Cree? Did they keep their talking book and read it? Did they turn and trust in the Lord Jesus Christ? No one knew for thirty years. Then one day, a dozen Indians came to the door of a missionary who had come to live in Canada. He had seen many Indians in his day, but never ones like this. Where had they come from? What did they want?

They held out a thick book, with covers made of reindeer skin and with pages made of birch-bark, thick like coarse brown paper. On it, in faded ink, were large, clumsily made letters of the Cree language. It was the very book that James Evans made for them!

"We have traveled thirteen days to find you," they told the missionary. Long ago a man came and made this book and taught our people how to read it; they told him, "but there much we don't understand. We have come to find a teacher, and we have come to ask you to show us its meaning and to send us a teacher."

Overjoyed the missionary answered, "Yes, of course, I will teach you. Come, my friends, sit by my fire," he said to them, "and I will tell you about Gitche Manito the Mighty and His Son, Jesus, that you might turn from your sins and trust in Him as Savior," just as James Evans had thirty years earlier.

**Cracking the Case:**

**It's time to answer our Case Questions.**

**1. Who had the tea chests? How did he make them talk?** James Evans. He used the lead from the tea chests to make letters for printing part of the Bible in the Cree language.

**2. Who did he want them to talk to? What did he want them to say to these people?** The Cree Indians. James Evans left them this Bible portion to be able to know the good news of Jesus, trust in Him as their Savior and be saved. He wanted them to begin to live for God.

**Something for Me and You**

**Our Bible Truth is:**

**We Must Trust Him as Our Savior and Obey Him as Our Lord**

**Our Bible Verse is Romans 10: 9-10:**

"...if you confess with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you confess and are saved."

Can you imagine making so many sacrifices for someone to hear about Jesus? James Evans was willing to make them because he knew it was worth any sacrifice to bring the good news of Jesus to people who had never heard. He wanted them to be able to confess with their mouths and believe in their hearts that God raised Jesus from the dead so that they could be saved.

Let's praise our God who saves for raising up men so like James Evans and his Indian friends to be willing to make great sacrifices to tell others how they can trust in Jesus as their Savior. Let's ask Him to work in our hearts that we might trust Jesus as our Savior. And let's ask Him to raise up more people—people like you and me, even—who would be willing to make great sacrifices so that others might hear about Jesus.

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## **SNEAKY SNACK**

Can you figure out how this snack relates to the story?

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### **Snack: Food for Dog and Man**

Goldfish cracker "Fish" like the sled dogs ate, beef jerky "pemmican" and iced herbal tea.

**Case Tie-in:** James Evans chose to do very difficult things in order that the Cree Indians might hear the good news of Jesus, believe and be saved. He endured very, very cold weather as he traveled by sled dog up into the Far North where they lived. He worked hard to figure out a way to give them the Bible in their own language, even melting down the lead in his tea crates to make printing stamps to do this.

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## **SOUL FOOD**

Food for thought during snack time

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1. What does the snack have to do with the story?

Choose a few questions from the other activity discussion sheets to talk about during this snack time.

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Directions: Read and discuss Bible Truth, using a FEW of the questions. Play game. Feel free to modify the game to fit your children.

### **We Must Trust Jesus as Our Savior and Obey Him as Our Lord**

It isn't enough to simply think that Jesus is the only way to God. We need to trust in Jesus as our own Savior; and, we need to begin a new life of living for Him.

We need to confess to God that we are a sinner and ask His forgiveness for our sins. We need to believe that Jesus suffered and died on the cross as the perfect payment for our sins; and that three days later, He rose from the dead in victory over death. We need to turn our lives over to Him, asking Him to help us to love and live for Him in everything we do.

Trusting in Jesus to be our Savior is a wonderful work that God does by His Holy Spirit in the hearts of His people. He delights for us to ask Him to send the Holy Spirit to do this work in our heart.

When we trust in Jesus as our Savior, we also accept Him as our Lord. "Lord" is an old word used in the Bible that we don't use much anymore. It means someone who is in charge and who we are to obey. The sign of someone who truly trusts in Jesus as their Savior, is whether they also are trying to live to please God.

God's people want to obey Him in everything they do, but they can't do that on their own--and they don't have to. God gives believers His Holy Spirit to live inside them and help them to grow in love and in obedience to Him. God always gives us what we need to be His people, if we but ask!

### **Understanding the Bible Truth**

1. Why isn't it enough to just know that Jesus is the only way to God? *Because we can know something with our minds and there never be a change in our hearts or lives. If we are truly saved, our hearts will be changed and our lives will show that change as we live to love and obey God.*
2. What must we do besides know that Jesus is the only way? *Ask Him to be our Savior, confess our own sins to Him, ask Him to forgive us, trust in our hearts that He died for us and that we are forgiven, and live our lives for Him.*
3. What do we need to believe about Jesus? *That He suffered and died on the cross as the perfect payment for our sins; and then three days later, He rose from the dead in victory over death.*
4. Who do we turn our life over to, if we want Jesus to be our Savior? How do we do that? *We need to turn our lives over to Him, asking Him to help us to stop living live to please ourselves, but instead to live to please God.*
5. What does "Lord" mean? *It means someone who is in charge and who we are to obey.*
6. What is the sign of someone who truly trusts in Jesus as their Savior? *That they are trying to live to please God, instead of just living life their own way.*
7. Who works in our hearts when we trust in Jesus? *God does, by His Holy Spirit.*
8. Who do God's people want to obey in everything they do? *God.*
9. Can they obey God on their own? Who helps them? *No, they can't on their own. The Holy Spirit will help them.*
10. What does God delight to do in our heart, if we ask Him? *To help us to trust in Jesus as our Savior and live for Him.*

### **Bible Verse Connection Question**

1. What does our Bible Truth have to do with our **Bible Verse: Romans 10:9-10**: "...if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved."?

*This verse tells us that we are saved when we believe in our hearts that Jesus died on the cross and rose from the dead in victory over sin.*

### **Bible Truth Story Connection Questions**

1. Why did James Evans make so many sacrifices to tell the Crees about Jesus? *He traveled in the terrible, wintry conditions because he knew they needed to know about Jesus if they would be saved. He went to so much effort to leave them a Bible because he knew that God would use His Word to work in their hearts to want to confess their sins and believe in Jesus.*
2. Why did the Crees travel so far to find a missionary? *God's Word had been working in their hearts and desired to believe in Jesus, yet there was so much they still did not understand and wanted to know so that they would be saved.*

**Life Application Questions**

1. Are there any sins we can commit that Jesus cannot forgive if we ask Him? *No!*
2. Who can God's people go to for help in trusting in Jesus? Why? *God. He promises to never turn away anyone who comes to Him. He promises to give faith to all who ask Him for it.*
3. How can we become God's people? *By turning away from our sins and trusting in Jesus as our Savior.*

**ACTS Questions**

1. What is something we can praise God for because of this Bible Truth?  
*Praise God for being the Savior of His People.*
2. What are sins we can confess to God because of this Bible Truth?  
*Confess that we are sinners who have rebelled against God and His good ways. We deserve His punishment! We need Him to be our Savior!*
3. What is something we can thank God for because of this Bible Truth?  
*Thank God for making the way, Himself, through Jesus, that we might be saved.*
4. What is something we can ask God for because of this Bible Truth?  
*We can ask God to work in our hearts that we would want to turn away from disobeying Him and trust in this wonderful Jesus as our own Savior. We can ask Him to work in the hearts of others, too, that they might be saved.*

**The Gospel**

1. What is the good news that we need to believe to be saved? What is the gospel?  
*God is the good Creator and King of the world. He made people to worship Him and live by His good laws. But we are all sinners who have rebelled against Him. We all deserve death--God's just, eternal punishment for our sins. How terrible! But God has good news for us. In His great mercy, God sent His Son Jesus to earth to save sinners. Yes, Jesus, the perfect Son of God, left His home in heaven and became a man. He lived the perfect life that pleases God. (He's the only one who has ever done that!) He offered it up to God His Father as the perfect sacrifice for sins when He suffered and died on the cross. Then, on the third day, Jesus rose from the dead in victory. He had fully paid for the sins of God's people, so they wouldn't have to! Now all who turn away from their sins and trust in Jesus as their Savior will receive forgiveness of sins and eternal life with God. They will be His very own special people who will know Him and enjoy Him forever. We can be God's people, too, if we turn from our sins and trust in Jesus as our own Savior.*



## Game: Circus Lions

### Materials

Optional funny wig, glasses, hat, etc.

Hula hoop, etc.

Bible Truth Questions

### Preparing the Game

1. Choose 20+ questions for your game from the Bible Truth Discussion Questions, or make up your own.
2. Write the Bible Truth questions on small thin strips of paper (or make a photocopy of the Bible Truth Discussion Questions and simply cut them into strips) and put them in the bag/bowl.

### Playing the Game

Tell the children that they are circus lions. Have them get on all four and roar and roam like lions. Have them “jump” through a hula hoop, etc. Then tell them they are getting very, very sleepy and must lie down....on their backs... in their den. Tell them that sleeping lions lie very still, make no noise, and keep their eyes open! Tell them that you are the Lion Trainer and are trying to wake up the Sleeping, Lazy Lions to perform in the circus. Any lion that makes a move, a sound or smiles will have to get up! Put on your funny wig, glasses, hat, etc. and make your rounds, trying to catch the lions moving, making noise or to make them smile. Lions who are caught are asked to answer a question correctly as their circus trick to before they can go back to their den. Have one of the lions caught to pick a question. Read it to the whole class and take their answers. If they don't get it right, then the child/children must stay out until the next round and next correct answer. If desired, let some of the children take turns being the Lion Trainer.

Game continues as number of questions, time, and attention span allow.

### Non-competitive Option

Let all the caught lions join back into the circus, even if the class answers a question incorrectly. Put the question back in the bag for further review.

### Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Quiz Questions

Have the children choose a few of the questions from the game to ask the parents/other children during TAKING IT TO OTHERS time. Help pre-readers by whispering the question in their ear and letting them ask it aloud to the parents/other children. Make sure you read the Bible verse aloud before you ask your questions.

Directions:

1. Write words to song in large print before class.
2. Play the song for the children, helping them follow along on the song sheet.
3. Discuss the song, using a few questions from the discussion sheet. *Don't use them all!*
4. Introduce sign language for key words of your choice from sign language sheet for your song. Use as few or as many as you think the children can learn.
5. Sing and sign the song. Sign language as well as large format lyrics and sheet music are found in the PFI Unit Songbook or online.
6. If desired, play the Song Game.

**Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Presenting and Singing the Song**

1. Sing and sign the song, encouraging the watching children/parents to join in.
2. Ask the class some of the questions listed below. The Bible Truth Connection Question is particularly good to help them understand how the song ties in with the Bible Truth.

**Understanding the Song**

1. What is "perfect redemption"? *To have your sins completely, perfectly paid for.*
2. Whose blood is the only perfect redemption for our sins? Why? *Jesus: Because only He lived the perfect life that could please God. Only He could offer up His life—His blood—as an acceptable sacrifice for sins.*
3. What is the promise of God? *To pardon every believer who truly believes.*
4. What does "vilest offender" mean? *The worst of sinners.*
5. What does the vilest offender have to do to have his sins forgiven? *Truly believe in Jesus as his Savior.*
6. Why does Jesus pardon make us want to praise and rejoice in the Lord? *Because His pardon is perfect and we never have to worry about our sins again. Because we could never deserve such a wonderful gift.*
7. What does it mean to come to the Father through Jesus the Son? *Trusting in Jesus' death and sacrifice is the only way we can know the Father, the holy, perfect God.*

**Bible Truth Connection Question**

1. How does this song relate to our Bible Truth: **We Must Trust in Jesus as Our Savior?**

*It is not enough to know that Jesus can save, we must trust Him to be our Savior. When we do—even if we have been the worst of sinners—we can know that God will save us, just as He has promised. This makes us want to give God the glory for the great things He has done for us.*

**Story Connection Question**

1. How does this song relate to today's story? *James Evans chose to make such great sacrifices in order that the Cree Indians might know that they could come to Jesus and receive perfect redemption through Him. As Cree Indians turned to Jesus and trusted Him as their Savior, they added a new language, a new people, who praised God for the great things He had done through Jesus.*

**Life Application Questions**

1. How can our lives be affected by the message of this song?  
*We can praise God who is willing to forgive us our sins, no matter how many or how terrible they are. We can ask Him to help us to truly believe in Him that we would be saved. We can ask God to help us praise His name to others that they might know, too, what an amazing Savior He is.*
2. How can we become God's people? *By turning away from our sins and trusting in Jesus as our Savior.*

**Bible Connection Question**

1. What does this hymn have to do with our Bible Verse: **Romans 10:9-10**: "...if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved."?

*No matter who you are and what you have done, you can receive a pardon for all your sins when you truly believe in Jesus (that is, when you have confessed your sins to God, turned away from them and trusted in Jesus as your Savior). **ACTS Questions**

1. What is something we can praise God for from this hymn?

2. What are sins we can confess to God from this hymn?

*We can confess that we are vile offenders against God and His good ways. We have all chosen to rebel against Him. We deserve God's punishment! Our only hope is for Him to save us, through the blood of Jesus.*

3. What is something we can thank God for from this hymn?

*We can thank God sending Jesus to save His people from their sins. We can thank Him that He can save anyone, even the vilest offender (the worst of sinners) when they turn from their sins and truly believe in Him.*

4. What is something we can ask God for from this hymn?

### Preparing the Game

None.

### Learning the Verse

Some or all of your children may be non- or early readers. Teach the verse in sections, having them say it after you. Repeat a few times. Add clapping or other movement as they say it.

### Directions

1. If desired, lead the children in a discussion of a **FEW** of the most important questions before beginning game.

2. Explain the game to them as follows:

Have the children sit or stand in a group. Tell them that one person will leave the room and another person will hide the object. After the object is hidden the Seeker will begin to look for the object. **STORY REVIEW**

Directions: Read and discuss Bible Truth, using a FEW of the questions. Play game. Feel free to modify the game to fit your children.

**General Story Questions**

1. What was so difficult about James Evans journey to the Cree Indian village? *Because it was so very, very cold and there was no place to stay out of the cold on the long journey to the Cree's village. There also were wild animals that could eat you.*
2. What did men do besides eat and wrap themselves in their blankets at night? What does that tell you about how important how important Jesus was to them? *They had a time of singing to the Lord and prayed. It was just as important to pray to God as it was to feed their bodies.*
3. Why did James Evans not think it was enough to just tell the Crees about Jesus? *He knew that he would only be with them a few months a year at the most. He knew they needed a way to learn about Jesus all the time, whether he was there or not.*
4. What did James Evans have to do in order to make the Crees a Bible? *He had to make up an alphabet, teach the Cree to read, make the paper and symbol stamps; then, stamp the Bible out by hand.*
5. What did he use the birch bark and tea chests to make? *Birch bark to make paper. Lead from the tea chests to make the little symbol stamps.*
6. How did they make the birch bark into paper? *They cut it into thin pieces and pounded it into paper.*
7. What did Evans use as a guide to make their alphabet? *Hunters' sign pictures.*
8. What good could leaving them with a Bible do that just Evans' words could not? *They did not have to just rely on their memory about how who Jesus was and what they must do to be saved. The Holy Spirit uses God's Word in a special way to bring people to turn and trust in Him.*

**Bible Verse Connection Question**

1. What does the story have to do with our Bible Verse: **Romans 10:9-10:** "...if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes and is justified, and with the mouth one confesses and is saved."?  
*James Evans knew that the Cree would not be saved, if they did not know the good news of Jesus. ## Game: Shoe Search and Ransom

### Materials

The children's shoes

Masking Tape

Story Review Questions, one per child

Paper and marker/pencil for writing questions and keeping score

### Preparing the Game

1. Choose 20+ questions for your game from the Story Review Discussion Questions, or make up your own.
2. Hide the questions around the room. Make a line out of tape for each team, approximately long enough to place one shoe per child per team on it.

### Playing the Game

Have the children sit down in lines of equal teams. Have them take off one of their shoes and give them to you to place along the taped line in front of their team and then sit back down in their groups. Tell them that in order for them to get back their shoes, they will have to do a little searching and ransoming. Explain that questions on small pieces of paper are hidden around the room. You will alternate between the two teams asking the first person in each line to get up and find a question for their team to answer. (The person hunting can ask for suggestions, if desired, from his/her seated teammates.) If the team answers it correctly, then that child's shoe is "ransomed". If not, then the question goes to the other team to answer. If they answer it correctly, then the first team member's shoe is ransomed.

Continue until all shoes are ransomed. Repeat game as time and attention spans allow.

### Non-competitive Option

Don't split into teams. Have the children sit down in a circle around the pile of shoes. Let one or two children at a time search for a question for the teacher to ask the group. If the group gets it right, then the child/children can ransom one of their shoes. Continue until everyone has their shoes ransomed.

**CASE REPLAY, JR: YOUNGEST CHILDREN**

**Description:** The children will act out the story together, everyone doing the same action/sound effect at the same time. This activity is most suitable for kindergarteners.

**Materials**

The Case RePlay, Jr. script for younger children

**Preparation**

1. Read through the script and write in the blanks along the side possible actions/sound effects the children could do to act it out.

**Instructions**

1. Tell the children that they will be re-enacting the story together as you tell it.
2. As you read the script, lead the children in actions/sound effects to do with you.
3. If desired, you can read the script and stop at certain sentences and ask them what a good action/sound effect would be to act out what you just read.
4. Repeat the re-enactment one or two times more.

**CASE REPLAY, SR: OLDER CHILDREN**

**Description:** The children act out the story as a three-scene play. You will narrate it using the Case RePlay, Sr. script and they will act it out (no spoken words, for the most part), with each child assuming a different character's role. This activity is most suitable for first grade and up. You will review the story, then practice it a few times before performing it for others.

**Materials**

The Case RePlay, Sr. script

White board or other large format paper (if using a word bank)

Costumes and props

**Preparation**

1. Prepare for the play by choosing costumes and props for each character in the story. Decorate the area with any scenery props.
2. Write the words "Beginning," "Middle," "End" on a large piece of paper/whiteboard with plenty of space under each heading. You will use this paper to help the children think about the story as a three-scene play, as it is presented in the script.

**Instructions**

1. Tell the children that they will get to act out the story as a three-scene play, with a beginning, middle and end section. Tell them that before they can act it out, they need to think it out. as you narrate it with your script.
2. Take the children's answers as they recount the story, helping them put key incidents in the right order.
3. If desired, when they have filled in their Beginning, Middle, End, read through your whole (real) script, so they hear exactly what you will have them act out.
4. Then tell the children that it's time to practice acting out the story.
5. Assign parts to each child. If you are using costumes, do NOT give them out at this point. They will be a distraction.
6. Have all the children sit on the floor or in chairs on one side of the "stage," then call the characters up in place as their part in the story comes.
7. As you read the script, guide the children in where you want them to move or do to act it out.
8. After going through the whole script once, give out any costumes and props and act out the script once or twice more.

**Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Re-enacting the Story**

Read the script as the children act out together (younger) or assuming different roles (older) as the other children or the parents watch.

1. Our craft is: The Gospel in the Sign Pictures of the Cree Language.

2. In the frozen north of Canada, James Evans worked long hours, stamping by hand the Gospel in the sign pictures of the Cree language so that the Cree Indians could read about Jesus in their own language.

3. Our Bible Truth is: We Must Trust Jesus as Our Savior and Obey Him as Our Lord.

4. James Evans sacrificed so much to give the Cree Indians the Gospel in their own language so that they might turn from their sins and trust Jesus as their own Savior.

5. Our craft can help us remember that making a way for people to hear about salvation through Jesus is worth making great sacrifices!

Note: Even non-readers can participate in presenting the craft, if you will whisper what they are to say in their ear and let them say it aloud for the others to hear.



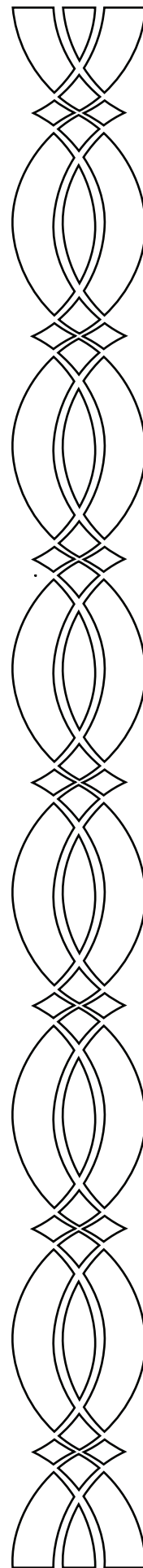
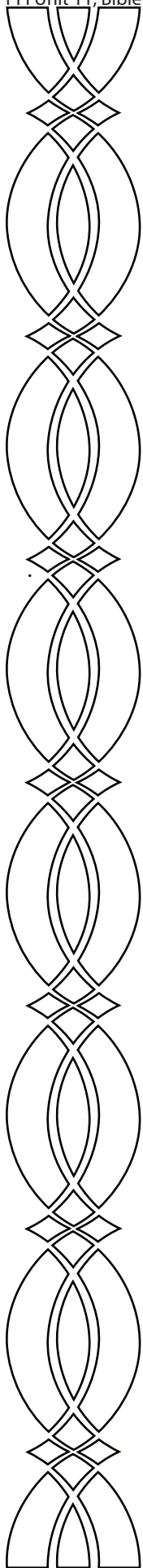

**BEFORE CLASS:****1. PICK YOUR PERSON**

VIPPs can be anyone in your church! Typically, they fall into 6 categories: Church staff, Elders, Deacons/deaconesses, Special Volunteers (people who aren't paid, but spend a lot of time helping out in particular ways), Supported Workers (aka missionaries), and Church Members.

**2. GATHER YOUR FACTS**

Use the VIPP Information Sheet to write down the facts about your VIPP. The information on this worksheet is used in the VIPP activities, listed in the "Choose an Activity" section below.

**DURING THE ACTIVITY:****1. INTRODUCE YOUR VIPP**

Introduce your VIPP to the children, using the VIPP Information Sheet. Fill in a set of VIPP Clue Cards with the information for your VIPP. If desired, you can even have the actual person come into class for the children to meet.

Need help describing what someone does for the church in a kid-friendly way? Check out the list of common VIPPs on the Praise Factory website in the PFI resources. There are lots of kid-friendly descriptions for common VIPP's, such as pastors, elders, deacons and a lot more.

**2. PRAY!**

Lead the children in praying for the VIPP. Ask the children if they would like to pray for one of the VIPPs prayer requests. Even non-readers can pray for the VIPP if you whisper the prayer request in their ear, then let them say it aloud. Never force a child to pray!

**3. CHOOSE AN ACTIVITY**

There are two activities you can use to help the children learn about the VIPP:

**VIPP Clue Cards:** These are nine coloring sheets in which children fill in the nine things they learn about the VIPP from the VIPP Information Sheet. Photocopy a set of each child. Use as few or as many of these Clue Cards as you desire. They are found in the back of this book.

**VIPP Game:** This is a game that uses a set of Clue Cards for one or two VIPPs.

Choose a VIPP and fill in his/her information on the VIPP Information Sheet. Fill in a set of VIPP Clue Cards with the information for your VIPP. Tell the children about the VIPP, having them fill in the VIPP Clue Cards with the key facts as they learn them. Write any words the children need to write on a white-board or other piece of paper so they can see how to spell them. Help younger children write these words on their clue cards. Ideas for how to tell the children about many common VIPPs are listed at [praisefactory.org](http://praisefactory.org) with the resources for this Bible Truth.

**Optional TAKING IT TO OTHERS Activity: Introduce and Pray for the VIPP**

If you are presenting the VIPP to other children or parents you can assign children to hold up the 10 clue cards and say what each card tells about the VIPP. (Or, you can have the children hold them up as you tell what each one means.) Then lead the children in praying for the VIPP.

## Game: Beanbag Toss In

### Materials

Information for one VIPP

2 Sets of Clue Cards

8 Letter-sized Envelopes or folders

Bean Bag(s), one per child

Tape

### Preparing the Game

1. Fill in one set of clue sheets for the VIPP you are using.
2. Tape the other (blank) set of Clue Cards to the outside of the manilla envelopes.
3. Put the filled-in clue cards in the corresponding envelope.
4. Tape each down to the floor, fairly close together.

### Playing the Game

**Reveal:** Tell the children about the VIPP, showing them your filled-in clue cards as you tell about them.

**Review:** At your signal, have the children take toss their bean bags onto the envelopes. Then one that has the most bean bags on it./near it is the one you will open. (The children may have fun taking turns designating one as the target before tossing.) The teacher (or the child) tells the Clue Card category. The other children try to remember what the VIPP's answer was. Open it up and see if they got it right. If they did, the Clue Card is retired. If not, it can be added back into the Clue Cards to be tossed at.
